"Somewhere Beyond the Sea" by TJ Klune (Adult fiction; call number F KLU)

The book introduces you to magical children who are sent to an island to live because they can be dangerous according to DICOM, the Department in Charge of Magical Youth. A new magical child is sent to join the six magical children who already live in the "orphanage". Arthur and Linus, the caretakers of these children, need to decide if this new child will fit in with a gnome, a sprite, a wyvern, a tentacled green blob, a Pomeranian shape-shifter, and The Antichrist. I won't tell you the magical character that this new child is because I don't want to ruin the fun. There is tension between the humans and the magical creatures of the island. There is corruption in DICOM that plays a part in the tension between the organization and the caregivers on this island. Throughout the story, you see the loving, caring, loyal, and protective nature of these magical children and adults.

This is Book 2 in the Cerulean Chronicles. I love the characters in these books and recommend reading them in order. Both books are funny and heartwarming. You'll find "Somewhere Beyond the Sea" in Adult Fiction section but I highly recommend it for older youth and young adults. Cheryl
